Samuel Fairbank Blodgett, B.A. 1874.

Born September 24, 1849, in Jacksonville, Ill

Died January 7, 1944, in Kansas City, Mo

Parents, Willard and Margaret T. Blodgett of Jacksonville Prepared at Phillips Academy, Exeter, N.H. Member Delta Kappa at Yale

Unoccupied 1874-75, teacher grammar school Hinsdale, Ill, 1875-76 and Southboro, Mass., 1876-79; principal Peters High School, Southboro, 1879-87; superintendent public schools Milford, Mass, 1887-96, Framingham 1896-1913, Randolph, Holbrook, and Avon Union School District 1913 until retirement 1917, resided in Kansas City 1926-44, member Masonic order and Episcopal church.

Married June 6, 1878, in Stoneham, Mass, Annie Elizabeth, daughter of Samuel W. Parker. Son George Parker Mrs. Blodgett died October 18, 1937.

Death due to bronchial pneumonia Buried in Mount Moriah Cemetery, Kansas City. Survived by son, two grandchildren, and two great-grandchildren.

William Parkin, B.A. 1874.

Born September 3, 1854, in New London, Conn

Died December 24, 1943, in New York City

Father, William Winthrop Parkin, a merchant in New York City, son of Dr. John S. W. Parkin and Mary (Hitchcock) Parkin Mother, Frances Moore (Rogers) Parkin; daughter of Dr. J. Smythe Rogers and Augusta Temple (Winthrop) Rogers of New York City

St. Paul's School, Concord, N H. Entered Yale College Sophomore year, philosophical oration appointment Junior year, salutatory oration appointment Senior year; president Berkeley Association Senior year, member Yale University Dramatic Association, Delta Beta Xi, Delta Kappa Epsilon, Skull and Bones, and Phi Beta Kappa.

Attended Columbia University School of Law 1874-76 (LL.B. 1876) and clerk in an office in New York City; admitted to the bar; lawyer in New York City 1878 until retirement 1939, member Whiting [John B., '74] & Parkin (later Gibson, Whiting & Parkin) 1878-84; clerk MacFarland, Reynolds & Harrison 1884-90; partner MacFarland & Parkin 1890-97, clerk United States Circuit Court of Appeals, Second District, 1897-1939, life member New York National Academy of Design; member Century Association and Episcopal church.

Unmarried.

Death due to heart disease Buried in Cedar Grove Cemetery, New London. Survived by two sisters, the Misses Augusta and Alice Temple Parkin of New York City.

Cornelius Royal Wallace, B.A. 1874.

Born October 27, 1845, in Medford, Mass.

Died March 17, 1944, in West Palm Beach, Fla.

Parents, Alfred and Harriet (Newell) Wallace. Prepared at Phillips Academy, Andover, Mass Member Gamma Nu at Yale.

Attended Union Theological Seminary 1874-75; private tutor in Philadelphia 1875-76 and New York City 1876-77; teacher in public schools of New York City 1877 until retirement 1906; lived abroad for some time but for many years before his death resided in West Palm Beach

Married (1) March 6, 1885, in Greenwich, Conn., Anna Schlumberger Von Bach, daughter of Johann G. Schlumberger (Ph D. University of Munich), and Schell Schlumberger. No children. Mrs. Wallace died in 1915 Married (2) about 1930, in Florida Mrs. Wallace died January 10, 1940.

Death due to gastroenteritis Ashes scattered on Lake Worth, Fla. Survived by a stepdaughter, Mrs. Charles Howard, four stepgrandchildren, and ten stepgreat-grandchildren.

Since January 16, 1941, Mr Wallace had enjoyed the distinction of being the oldest living graduate of Yale.

Franklin Augustus Gaylord, B.A. 1876.

Born May 1, 1856, in Yonkers, N.Y.

Died August 14, 1943, in Teaneck, N.J.

Father, Augustus Gaylord, a broker in New York City, adjutant general of Wisconsin during Civil War Mother, Martha (Champlin) Gaylord.

Milwaukee (Wis.) Academy. High oration appointment Junior and Senior years; English composition prize Senior year; president Class De-

bating Club Senior year; Class poet; member Delta Kappa, Alpha Sigma Phi, Delta Kappa Epsilon, and Phi Beta Kappa

Attended Union Theological Seminary 1878-81, teacher Cornwall-on-Hudson 1876-78 and Brooklyn and New York City 1884-87; traveled in Europe studying French and German 1882-84; ordained in Presbyterian church 1894; minister Trinity Congregational Church of Tremont, New York City, 1895-99; associated with Young Men's Christian Association 1887-94 and 1899 until retirement about 1921; general secretary of the Association in France and minister American chapel in Paris 1887-94, instrumental in erection of new building in Paris; general secretary in Russia 1899-1917 and took active part in organization and incorporation of Society for the Moral and Physical Development of Young Men, Lenin-grad, and similar work in Moscow; aided Russian refugees in Berlin, Warsaw, and Belgrade; secretary American hospital for wounded Russian soldiers during World War I; served in Russia until all Americans were withdrawn from Russian territory, general secretary International Committee, Y M C A., 1918-21 and represented Committee at Odessa, Constantinople, and Cairo 1920; lectured in the United States and many European cities 1921; author: *The Builders of the Atoll* (1935) and of many other poems published in magazines; translated several Russian poems, presented to Czar Nicholas II in 1907 and 1911, chevalier Order of St Anne (third class) 1902, Order of St Stanislaus 1916, and of the Russian Red Cross 1920; resided at West Englewood, N.J., 1919-43; trustee James Stokes Society, acting Class secretary 1930, Class secretary 1930-43, and Class agent 1930-42; member Town Hall Club, Clergy Club of New York, and Authors Club (London).

Married September 10, 1891, in New York City, Mary Louise, daughter of Rev Charles Seymour Robinson, D D , LL.D (B A. Williams Coll. 1849; grad Princeton Theological Seminary 1855), and Harriet (Church) Robinson. No children.

Death due to cerebral thrombosis Ashes interred in Torrington, Conn. Survived by wife (died November 5, 1943).

Charles Sumner Mervine, B.A. 1877.

Born April 27, 1851, in Milton, Pa.

Died January 16, 1944, in West Palm Beach, Fla.

Father, Thomas Mervine, member White, Mervine & Lawson, manufacturers of agricultural implements, Milton; son of John and Elizabeth (Thomas) Mervine of Chester County, Pa Mother, Mary Russel (Batten) Mervine; daughter of Russel and Mary (Enriken) Batten of Chester County.

Milton High School. Class picture committee Senior year; member Gamma Nu and Psi Upsilon.

Teacher Milton High School 1877-78; attended Drew Theological Seminary 1878-81 (B D. 1881), received on trial Philadelphia Conference of Methodist Episcopal Church 1881; ordained deacon 1883 and elder 1885; minister New Holland, Pa., 1881-82, Franklinville 1882-84, Raubsville 1884-87, Tannersville 1887-90, Boehm's 1890-92, Georgetown, Gap, and Christiana 1892-95, Nesquehoning 1895-98, Siloam, West Philadelphia, 1898-1902, Frankford 1902-05, Pen Argyl 1905-08, Asbury Church, Philadelphia, 1908-12, Lebanon 1912-15, Royersford 1915-18, and Manayunk 1918 until retirement 1923, resided in Roxborough, Pa, since 1923, spending winters in Florida, secretary Class of 1877 from 1933 to 1944; secretary-treasurer Preachers Aid Society, Philadelphia Conference, 1926-35 and on board of trustees of the Conference 1922-40; member First Methodist Church, Roxborough

Married May 18, 1881, in Madison, N J, Cornelia Kitchel, daughter of Joseph Ely and Margaret Cook (Kitchel) Muchmore. Children: George Stickle (E E Lehigh Univ. 1905), Ernest Muchmore (M E Lehigh Univ. 1909), and Marguerite (Centenary Collegiate Inst. 1906-08) Mrs. Mervine died October 21, 1939.

Death due to senility. Buried in Mount Moriah Cemetery, Philadelphia. Survived by children, four grandchildren, six great-grandchildren, a sister, Mrs Jessie Mervine Stevens of Lorton, Va, and a brother, Dudley Tyng Mervine of La Grange, Ill

Alfred Lawrence Ripley, B.A. 1878.

Born November 6, 1858, in Hartford, Conn.

Died October 13, 1943, in Andover, Mass

Father, George Ripley, president National Hide & Leather Bank of Boston; son of Franklin and Charlotte (Barrett) Ripley of Greenfield, Mass. Mother, Mary Elizabeth (Aiken) Ripley; daughter of John and Mary Means (Appleton) Aiken of Andover Yale relatives include Frank R. Shipman, '85 (brother-in-law); and G. Ripley Cutler, '16, and Thomas L Shipman, '28 (nephews).

Attended Yale Graduate School 1878-79 (on University Baseball Team), Harvard Medical School 1879-80, and the universities of Bonn and Berlin 1882-83; tutor in Latin Yale University 1880-82 and in German 1883-85, assistant professor of German language and literature 1885-88, banker in Boston 1888-1943; vice-president National Hide & Leather Bank 1890-1901 and consolidated State National Bank 1901-08, president 1908-12, first vice-president Merchants National Bank of Boston (merged with State National Bank) 1912-17, president 1917-29, and chairman of the board 1929-43; a director Federal Reserve Bank of Boston 1923-27; lecturer Amos Tuck School of Administration and Finance, Dartmouth College, 1904 and 1906; M.A. Hon Yale 1888 and LL.D. 1935, LL.D. Dartmouth 1936; alumni fellow Yale Corporation 1899-1933 (member Prudential Committee 1901-33, Committee on Finance 1905-33, and Committee on Educational Policy 1919-23, 1928-30), trustee Peabody Museum of Natural History 1924-29; Class agent 1930-39 and Class treasurer 1930-43, president Yale Club of Boston 1923-25, Boston Clearing House Association 1924-33, trustee Phillips-Andover 1903-43 (president of the board 1908-29), Provident Institution for Savings 1917-43 (vice-president 1932-43), and Crocker, Burbank & Company Association 1934-42, moderator Andover town meetings; associate member American Academy of Arts and Sciences.

Akron High School; attended Western Reserve University 1874-76 Entered Yale College Junior year; Class baseball team and Class crew Junior year; Senior barge race, teacher Broadway Mission Senior year, chairman Class Day Committee; member Linonia and Delta Kappa Epsilon.

Tutor Illinois College, Jacksonville, 1878-80, admitted to the bar, lawyer in Chicago 1880-1905 and 1914 until retirement 1930 (member Dow, Walker & Walker, and Freeman & Walker, practiced independently 1914-30); United States attorney for southern district Indian Territory, Ard-

more, Okla , 1906-10 and third judicial division Alaska, Valdez, 1910-14, private Illinois Volunteer Training Corps World War I; member Central Church of Chicago

Married May 7, 1892, in Chicago, Maude Josephine, daughter of Samuel and Frances (Knight) Dow. Children. Dow and Richard Baxter. Mrs. Walker died December 9, 1941.

Death due to uremia Buried in Rosehill Cemetery, Chicago. Survived by children and one grandson.

Martin Clark, B.A. 1879.

Born February 25, 1855, in Buffalo, N.Y.

Died June 16, 1944, in Buffalo, N.Y.

Father, William Henry Clark, a merchant in Buffalo Mother, Elizabeth Adelia (Burt) Clark.

Central High and Buffalo Classical schools. Attended Yale College 1875-77, Class glee club; awarded degree in 1890 with enrollment in Class of 1879

Studied law in office of Lewis & Gurney, Buffalo, 1877-80; admitted to the bar 1880, lawyer in Buffalo 1880-1944; member Clinton & Clark 1882-1901; practiced independently since 1901; instructor in admiralty and maritime law and the practice and jurisdiction of United States courts at University of Buffalo Law School 1895-1902, attorney Buffalo State Hospital 1904-12, president Park Club 1905 and Yale Alumni Association of Buffalo 1917; organizer and charter member University Club of Buffalo; secretary and attorney board of managers Church Charity Foundation; a founder and life member Buffalo Public Library, life member American Economic Association, vestryman Trinity Church (Episcopal), Buffalo, 1927-30.

Married February 9, 1882, in Elmira, N.Y., Cora Lee, daughter of Stephen Potter and Lucy (Pratt) Bedell. Taught mathematics at Hudson Academy and studied law with Andrews & Edwards 1880-81; admitted to the bar 1881; member Hawver & Cochrane, Hudson, 1881-90 and Brownell & Cochrane 1890-1901; police justice in Hudson 1887-88; district attorney Columbia County, N.Y., 1889-92; United States Representative, 19th New York District, 1897-1901, justice of the Supreme Court, State of New York, 1902-15, associate justice Appellate Division 1916-21, presiding justice 1922-28, and official referee 1928-41; secretary Columbia County Republican Committee several years; vice-president Farmers National Bank, Hudson, 1922-29, president 1929-32; trustee Hudson Savings Bank 1910-32 and Hudson City Hospital 1930-33; member Columbia County and New York State Bar associations and Reformed Protestant Dutch Church, Hudson

The Russell H Chittenden Research Fund was established June 21, 1915, by gifts from his pupils. In 1926 Professor Chittenden established the Russell H Chittenden Prize, and in his will bequeathed his scientific library to the University.

FORMS OF BEQUEST

I give and bequeath to Yale University, a corporation existing under and by the virtue of a charter granted by the General Assembly of the Colony and State of Connecticut, and located in the Town of New Haven in said State,
. Dollars, to be used (*or*, the income to be used) for the following purposes:
(Here specify the purposes for which the bequest—or the income therefrom—is to be used.)

(It is strongly recommended that a competent lawyer be employed to prepare the will and to supervise its execution in order to comply with all the requirements of the law of the state in which the maker of the will resides. It is also wise to give the University considerable latitude in the use of any fund so that a change of circumstances may not impair the usefulness of the gift. The Treasurer of the University will be glad upon request to review the phrasing of any proposed form of bequest.)
